#### The Rector Writes:-

I had the pleasure of accompanying Year 5 of Tarporley Primary School at the start of October for the annual 'Pilgrim Day' at Chester cathedral. As well as learning about prayer, listening and seeing how the cathedral organ worked, and experiencing what life as a monk



at mealtimes would have been like, the pupils also learnt about the patron saint of Chester, St Werburgh, and why people might have travelled to Chester to pray at her shrine.

If you don't know much about St Werburgh, she was a princess, her father being King Wulfhere, a fierce pagan king of Mercia. Despite a privileged upbringing,

Werburgh rejected the trappings of the royal family, and devoted herself to a life of service as a nun, and later Abbess, in Weedon, Northamptonshire.

One day a gaggle of geese landed on a field owned by the Abbey and started eating the seeds of the crops that were to be grown for relief of the poor. Werburgh upbraided the birds, and shut them away in a pen – she promised them safety for the night in return for not eating the seeds again. However, unbeknownst to Werburgh, the Abbey steward took the plumpest goose that evening, and cooked it for his dinner. In the morning when Werburgh found one was missing, she was horrified and found out what had happened. Telling the steward to gather together all the parts of the goose that he had left over, Werburgh prayed, and miraculously the goose was returned to life and health. So now, Werburgh is often portrayed with a goose, and her pilgrim badge was a flock of geese.

Resurrecting geese aside, the main theme of Werburgh's story is one of the sanctity of hospitality, and the promise to keep those in her care safe. She was mortified that the security she had promised had been undermined, and she did all she could to make up for that.

The Church of England has designated Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> November as Safeguarding Sunday, a chance to reflect on the Church's failures in the past and present to care for the most vulnerable among us, and to inspire and encourage us as followers of Jesus to create and maintain churches as safe places for all people. November is usually a time of remembrance: for those who have died (at All Souls' time) and those who fought and sacrificed their lives for peace (at Remembrance), and so it is also fitting that in that season of remembrance, we remember our calling to be a people and place who care for all around us.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility – not just church officers and those in leadership. ALL followers of Jesus are asked to be vigilant, compassionate and take the lead in creating a safe place for people to experience God. Too often the very places that should be safest have been found to be dangerous. If you haven't already done so, please consider taking the Church of England's online Safeguarding training courses: they are very accessible and give practical guidance, and should only take an hour to complete. Please sign up at: https://safeguardingtraining.cofeportal.org/

We might not be able, like St Werburgh, to resurrect a goose, but surely spending an hour educating ourselves about safeguarding is manageable for saints like us, and a way to start creating and maintaining safe places in our parish.

#### The poppies of Remembrance

In late 1914, World War 1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.

But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'. (see page 12).

And it was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11 November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.

#### New independent chair for Church of England's National Safeguarding Panel

Nazir Afzal, the former chief crown prosecutor, known for his work in the Rochdale grooming gang cases and tackling gender violence, has been appointed as the next independent chair of the Church of England's National Safeguarding Panel (NSP)

Mr Afzal, a practising Muslim, and founder chair of the Catholic Church's safeguarding body in England and Wales, took up the role in September. The appointment was made through an independent recruitment process.

The NSP was set up in 2014 to provide vital reference and scrutiny from a range of voices, including survivors, on the development of policy and guidance. Its first independent chair was appointed in 2018. The work of the NSP is separate but complementary to work on wider independence in Church safeguarding.

Speaking on his appointment, Nazir Afzal said: "I am pleased to take on this important role to lead the continuing work on scrutinising and providing challenge to the Church of England's safeguarding governance, particularly its policy and guidance. The Church of England has a presence in every community across the country and with that comes huge responsibility. I look forward to playing my part in holding the Church to account by bringing my professional experience to the work of the Panel."


